Wangrycht contacted Lifestyle Homes to build the house after the fires tore through the city, burning down 33 homes in Palm

Luhn said they decided to forgo any profit on building the home, in order to keep the costs

down for a family who had lost everything and was starting

Satellite offers hurricane clues Jason-2 will help map out ocean

FLORIDA TODAY A new satellite about 800 miles

above Earth will help scientists better understand hurricane strength, rising sea levels and global warming.

Researchers worldwide can access the first climate data from the international satellite named Jason-2, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration announced Tuesday.

The satellite, named after the

mythological Greek leader of the Argonauts, will help scientists create a clearer picture of sealevel increases and changing ocean features around tropical cyclones. The satellite maps ocean heat that feeds storm in-

The near-real-time Jason-2 data is crucial for predicting sealevel rise, a leading NOAA scien-

"The sea level is rising at a rate of 3.2 millimeters per year, nearly twice as fast as the previous 100 years," Laury Miller, chief of NOAA's Laboratory for Satellite Altimetry, said in a news release. "If this rate continues unchanged during the coming decades, it will have a huge impact on coastal regions, with erosion and flooding.

From low orbit, the spacecraft monitors 95 percent of the world's ice-free oceans every 10

Jason-2, launched June 20 from California, is a joint effort between NOAA, NASA and European agencies.■

2009 predictions

On Dec. 10, William Gray's team at Colorado State University predicted 14 named storms between June 1 and Nov. 30, 2009. They expect seven of the 14 storms to become hurricanes. Of those seven, three will develop into intense or major hurricanes (of Category 3, 4 or 5) with sustained winds of 111 mph or greater, the team said.

Dog abuser faces jail by Friday

Judge gives Abrams bond deadline

VIERA — A Brevard County judge ruled that a woman convicted of abandoning her dog, which starved to death, can remain free while her case is being appealed if she posts \$5,000 bond by noon Friday

Christine Abrams, 30, technically only has to pay 10 percent of the bond, \$500, which her attorney said in court Tuesday is feasible. Judge Kelly McKibben also ruled Tuesday that Abrams must surrender her passport, obtain permission before traveling outside the state, cannot own an animal and must check in with a probation officer once a week

When approached by FLOR-IDA TODAY after the hearing, Abrams said she had no com-

Service groups, arts obtain county funds

VIERA — Despite the economic recession, North Brevard Charities, the Brevard Alzheimer's Foundation and a dozen other service organizations will receive county grant funding this year.

Tuesday, the Brevard County Commission unanimously voted to award \$979,895 to social- and human-service agencies that help the poor, elderly, children and other vulnerable residents.

In a similar move, commissioners voted 4-1 to award \$293,000 to 29 Brevard cultural groups, such as the Space Coast Ballet, Strawbridge Art League and Titusville Playhouse. Andy Anderson voted

The outlays, which total more than \$1.27 million, will be financed using the county general fund.

Commissioners agreed that the service agencies provide essential services to the impovercounty more cash to provide on its own. Jason Steele, chairman of the

Brevard County Republican Party executive committee, lobbied in favor of the funding. He is a board member of PRE-VENT! of Brevard, one of the 14 service agency grant recipients. And he said he struggled with drug addiction in 1985.
